EYRE PENINSULA FOOTBALL AND NETBALL CHALLENGE

On Tuesday of Week 5 this term we had over 60 year 8-12 students travel to Port Lincoln to participate in the annual Eyre Peninsula Open Football and Year 8/9 and Open Netball competitions.

The football team competed in a pool of 5 schools in Division 2. They got off to a slow start against Navigators, just managing to hold on to record a 7 point win. In the second game, despite inaccurate kicking, we convincingly defeated Tumby Bay by nearly 7 goals. Our next game was against the undefeated Ceduna. After kicking with the wind in the first half we wasted many opportunities to score and kicked inaccurately to enter half time with only 2 goals from 9 chances. Ceduna scored 2 goals against the wind in the first half and then used the wind well in the second half running out winners by 40 points. The final game was against Cummins where we used the ball far better in attack resulting in us scoring 5 goals without a miss and setting up a 12 point win.

In both the Open and Year 8/9 Netball competitions we entered 2 teams to cater for student interest. All four teams were competitive with each recording at least 1 win in the first round of matches. As a result of performances teams were then split into divisions for a second round of games. In the Year 8/9 competition Cleve 1 ended up making their way to the grand final undefeated before losing to Saint Josephs. In the Open Grade Cleve 2 performed admirably, only losing the 1 game for the day, whilst Cleve 2 won 2 games and lost 3.



We are excited for a positive and productive year, and encourage all students and staff to participate in these events.




