


PBL HEALTH EDUCATION PROGRAMS TAKE HOME MESSAGES WEEKS 8 and 9 of Term 4

YEARS 8 / 9

Lesson 13: Sexual Activity

Sex is a natural and enjoyable part of most adult sexual relationships, but there are many reasons why young people choose to delay in engaging in sexual activity. I need to have confidence and skills to negotiate for what I want and to develop trusting relationships. I have the right to feel safe within my relationships.

Lesson 14: Safe and unsafe practices (KS: CPC)

Some behaviours present a risk of contracting an infection. I can reduce risk by understanding how infections are transmitted and avoiding certain activities or protecting myself. It is most common for infections to be transmitted when body fluid from an infected person enters another person's body or harmful micro-organisms come into contact with moist surfaces. Sexually Transmitted Infections (STIs) are those that are transmitted through sexual activity. With accurate knowledge, I can reduce the risk of getting an STI.

Lesson 15: Internet and Evaluation (KS: CPC)

Responsible internet sites as a valuable source of information.

YEARS 10 /11 / 12

Lesson 13: What do you reckon? (KS: CPC)

There is a risk associated with engaging in some activities. Having accurate information and thinking about the activity before making a decision will help me to: determine whether it is safe; participate safely; minimise possible harm; or choose not to be involved.

Lesson 14: Where to go for help (KS: CPC)

Having a range of places and people to go to for advice, information and help is an important aspect of solving problems. Choice is important. Being able to make a decision based on understanding that advantages and disadvantages is a valuable skill. Once we know where to go for help, we need confidence about how to ask for help.

Lesson 15: Critical health literacy / Evaluation of course

Social media and the internet is a great source of health information and an effective way to locate relevant support services. However, to become a confident user of online health information it is essential that I can use my critical health literacy skills to determine the quality of a source by examining the validity and reliability of the site and its author. I am aware that just because something is on social media or the internet that doesn't necessarily make it accurate or true.

Happy end of 2020! Your child has now completed the relationships and sexual health education course for this year. We are interested in getting feedback from parents/carers on how useful this course has been for you and your child. The information will be collated and will assist to inform future planning for relationships and sexual health programs. Thank you.
