## PRINCIPAL NEWS

An example: Use the numbers: 4, 8, 5, and 4.  $5 \times 4 + 8 - 4 = 24 (5 \times 4 = 20, 20 + 8 = 28, 28 - 4 = 24)$ Your turn; the first set of numbers are 2, 6, 8, and 2. How did you go? Try this next set of numbers: 5, 3, 2, and 2 (a bit more challenging!).

The number of students who follow our CREW values daily is very impressive, and I am proud of how they care for our school and show great pride in their learning. Unfortunately, this week, I needed to speak with the Year 6-12 students about a range of issues (which I need to clarify by saying that a small percentage of our student cohort is undertaking). I thought it was important for all to hear the same message, though and that we all have a responsibility and a right as bystanders to 'call out' any behaviours which aren't appropriate. If we don't, then the people displaying the undesirable behaviours are given permission to continue with them. The small cohort of students in this instance is negatively impacting many students' learning time, and we have now been told, as a collective, that we don't want their distractive behaviours to continue. There is a saying, 'The behaviour we walk past is the behaviour we accept'. Hopefully, we all feel more empowered to let people know when they affect our learning or well-being.

Another issue I addressed was wearing caps and beanies during the school day (again, a small cohort of students). We are a Sun Smart school, and the policy states that all students and staff must wear a broadbrimmed hat all year round when outside. Beanies and caps are not part of the school uniform policy either. The students can go to the library or computer rooms on set days of the week. In inclement weather, the classrooms are opened at recess and lunchtime and supervised by staff.

### Shearing/Grinding workshop at Sims Farm TTC

Twelve shearers from across the Eyre Peninsula recently attended a two-day workshop at Sims Farm Trade Training Centre (TTC) to learn from experts about improving grinding techniques and managing comb/cutter selection.

Participants came from Arno Bay, Ungarra, Tumby Bay, Haslam, Warramboo, and Kimba.

The workshop was run by trainers Paul Oster from Naracoorte (SE), Shannon Warnest from Willooka (SE), and Klynt Correll from Ardrossan (YP). These trainers are employed by "Shearer-Woolhandler Training Inc."(SWTI), a registered training provider under the "Shearing Contractors of Australia Association" (SCAA) and funded through the "Australian Wool Industry" (AWI).

SWTI also provides trainers for the Sims Farm learner shearing school, conducted yearly at the Sims Farm TTC for Year 11 Ag Students.

The attendees then did a day's shearing at a shed near Waddikee to learn more about improving shearing techniques.

SWTI is impressed with our Sims Farm facility and hopes to use it more often for other advanced shearer training workshops.



The Pedal Prix Team competed in their first event of the year on the 18th of June, the 6-hour race at Victoria Park in Adelaide.

The Senior Team had an excellent result, finishing 14th out of 143 entrants despite only having four riders for the 6 hours. The Junior Team improved throughout, moving from around 125th to 103rd by the end of the day. This put them at 50th out of 64 Middle School Entries. I look forward to seeing what they can do as they gain experience.

































Dear parents, guardians and carers

#### Re: Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD)

Every year, all schools in Australia participate in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD). The NCCD process requires schools to identify information already available in the school about supports provided to students with disability. These relate to legislative requirements under the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992* and the Disability Standards for Education 2005, in line with the *NCCD guidelines* (2019).

Information provided about students to the Australian Government for the NCCD includes:

- · year of schooling
- · category of disability: physical, cognitive, sensory or social/emotional
- level of adjustment provided: support provided within quality differentiated teaching practice, supplementary, substantial or extensive.

This information assists schools to:

- · formally recognise the supports and adjustments provided to students with disability in schools
- · consider how they can strengthen the support of students with disability in schools
- develop shared practices so that they can review their learning programs in order to improve educational outcomes for students with disability.

The NCCD provides state and federal governments with the information they need to plan more broadly for the support of students with disability.

The NCCD will have no direct impact on your child and your child will not be involved in any testing process. The school will provide data to the Australian Government in such a way that no individual student will be able to be identified – the privacy and confidentiality of all students is ensured. All information is protected by privacy laws that regulate the collection, storage and disclosure of personal information. 

In July, we are going to host a Book Swap for Swap one of your good quality pre-loved books and with a book donated by somebody books for the Firstival!

















